
Historians and Archaeologists Study

The Battle of Ridgefield

The Ridgefield Historical Society and State Office of Historic Preservation have been awarded a National Park Service Grant to study the Battle of Ridgefield. The grant's Advisory Group has selected Heritage Consultants as the firm to lead the research on the Battle. The research team includes Dr. Kevin McBride, Professor of Anthropology at the University of Connecticut, Dr. David Naumec, Military Historian, and George David, archaeologist, and mapping specialist.

Over the next few years, the research team will conduct archaeological investigations of the Battle which occurred on April 27, 1777. Beginning in May, the consultants and volunteers will be on the ground

introducing themselves to landowners and the project. The success of the project is dependent on landowner permissions that grant the research team access to investigate properties associated with the Battle. Join us in this exciting, nationally funded project!

Battle of Ridgefield – Frequently Asked Questions

Does anyone have to participate in the program?

No, it is completely voluntary.

Can private property be taken or impacted by the National Park Service?

No, private property cannot be taken by any means.

How do you plan on surveying my property?

We would like permission to simply view your property to decide what potential there may be to find evidence of the Battle.

If your property is of interest we would like permission to survey your property using metal detectors. We anticipate most of the evidence will be metallic.

If your property yields particularly strong evidence of Battle we would like permission to conduct a limited archaeological investigation.

If I allow anyone to dig on my property will it ruin my yard?

No. It is standard professional archaeological practice to return the excavated area to its original state. This means backfilling any land that was dug and reseeding the area with grass.

What if evidence of a battlefield is discovered? What does that mean for me and my property?

Even if evidence is found, you will not be restricted in your rights of private property in the use, development or sale of your property.

Landholders are under no obligations whatsoever to participate in the Battlefield Protection Program. Again, participation in a survey is voluntary.

What if any artifacts are found on my property?

Artifacts, notes, and any records amassed by the Battle of Ridgefield ABPP grant will be donated to the National Park Service and/or the Ridgefield Historical Society and will be permanently maintained by a National Park Service approved institution such as an appropriate local museum or university.

Are there any restrictions to private lands or land use if the property is designated as part of a battlefield?

None. If the property is modified or the integrity is negatively affected the property is simply no longer part of the battlefield.

Landowner Permission to Conduct Archeological Research

Hereby give permission to representatives of Heritage Consultants, L.L.C. to conduct archeological research at the above-referenced property. I acknowledge that this research is associated with the National Park Service’s American Battlefield Protection Program grant “Battle of Ridgefield: Research and Long-Term Stewardship (June 19, 2020)” awarded to Ridgefield Historical Society. I acknowledge that the purpose of the grant is to document the battlefields and sites associated with the Battle of Ridgefield and will include archaeological investigations on the above-referenced property to identify artifacts associated with the Battle of Ridgefield. If associated artifacts are identified, they will be used to assess the integrity, boundaries and significance of the entire battlefield site for eventual inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places. I also acknowledge that any artifacts recovered from the above-referenced property are owned by the National Park Service and/or the State of Connecticut and will be curated in a repository that meets the standards of the National Park Service.

I acknowledge this research will occur between August 2022 and September 2024 with the following stipulations:

1. Archeological research will consist of three phases; a) preliminary walkover of the property, b) metal detector survey, c) recovery and identification of objects located during the metal detector survey;
2. Prior to any additional archeological investigations, I will be notified by phone and letter as to the precise date when the archeological investigations will take place;
3. If I wish to be present during the archeological investigations, the investigations will be scheduled on a day(s) when I can be present;
4. No archeological investigations in the form of excavations will take place without my expressed permission in writing;
5. If I decide to permit any excavation, the land shall be restored to its pre-existing condition;
6. Any person entering the property does so at their own risk, and I bear no responsibility for injury or loss;
7. I will receive a preliminary report of the findings within one month of the investigations, and will receive a copy of the final report within six months of the completion of the grant.
