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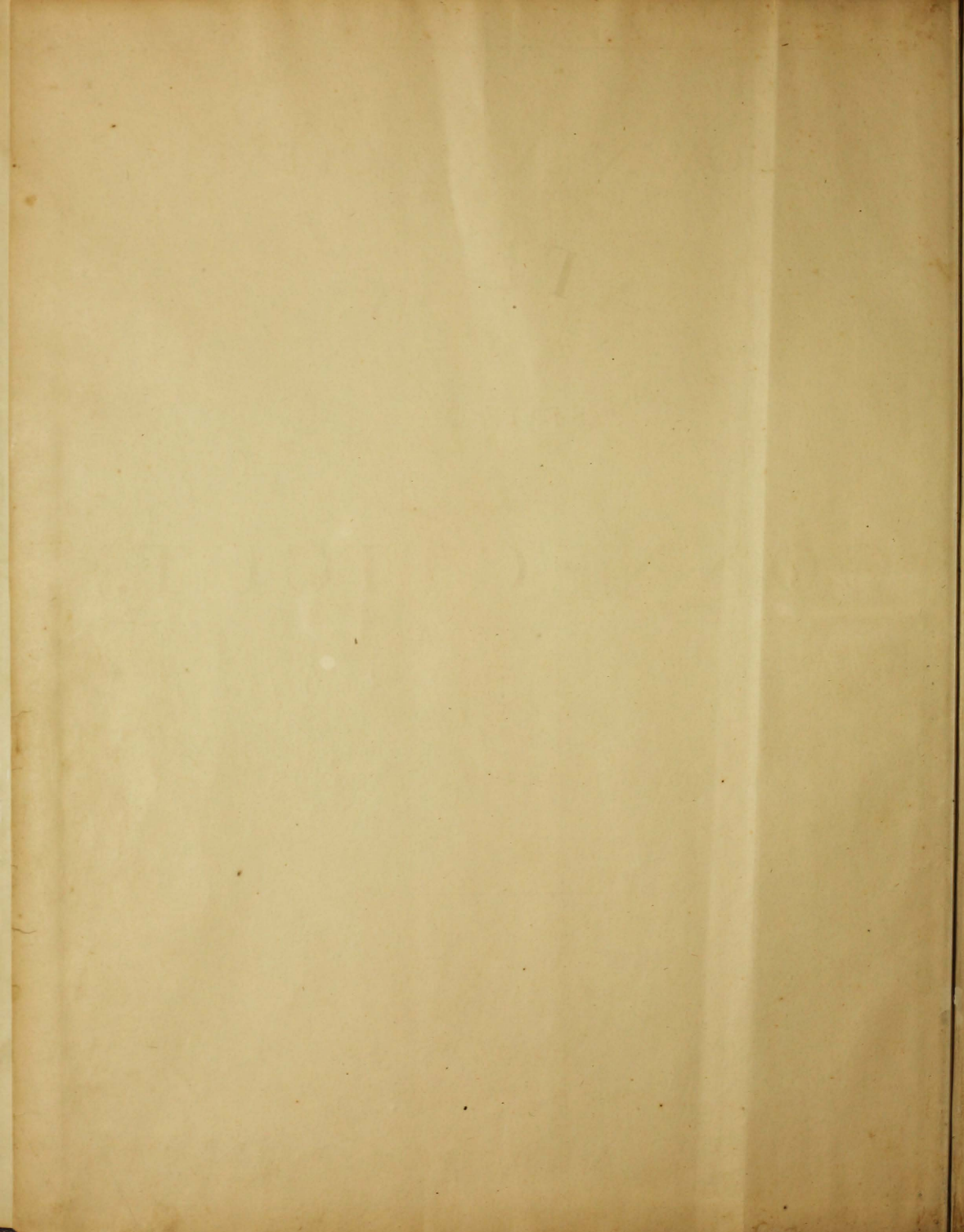


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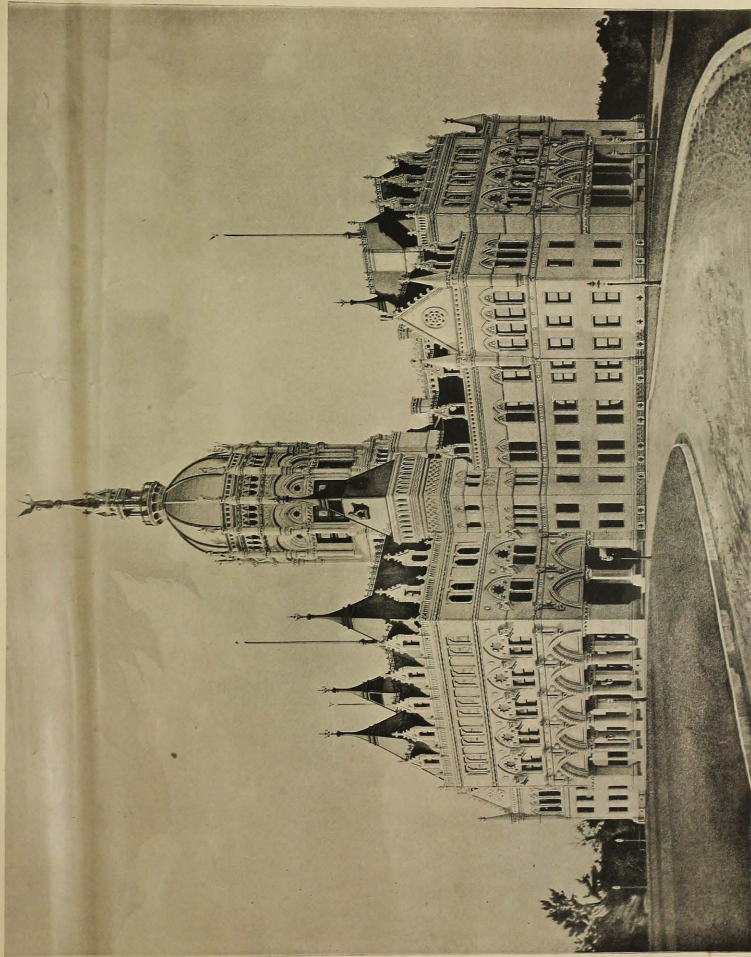
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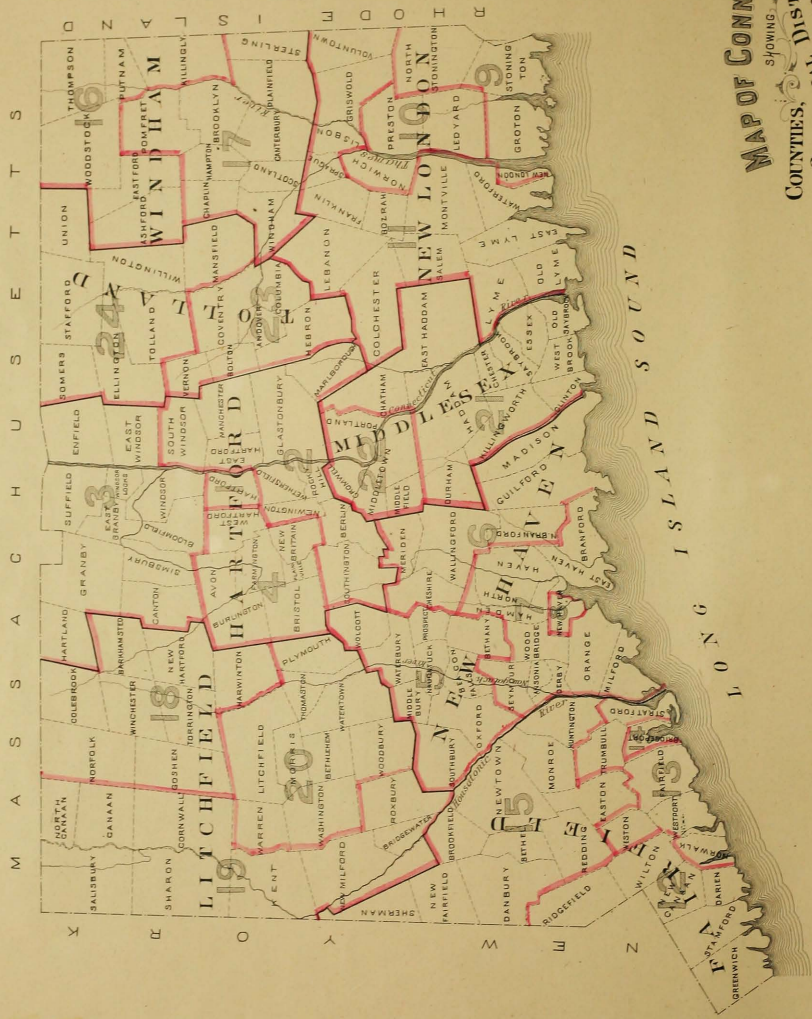


STATE CAPITOL

VIEW FROM THE SOUTH-EAST.



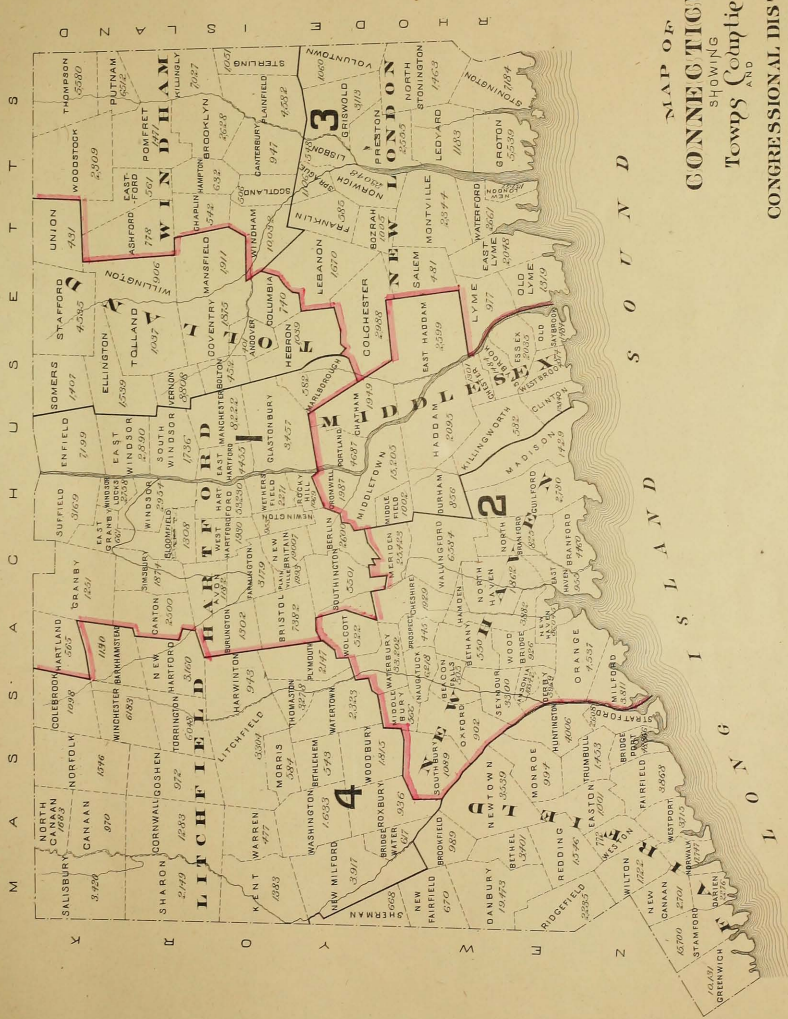






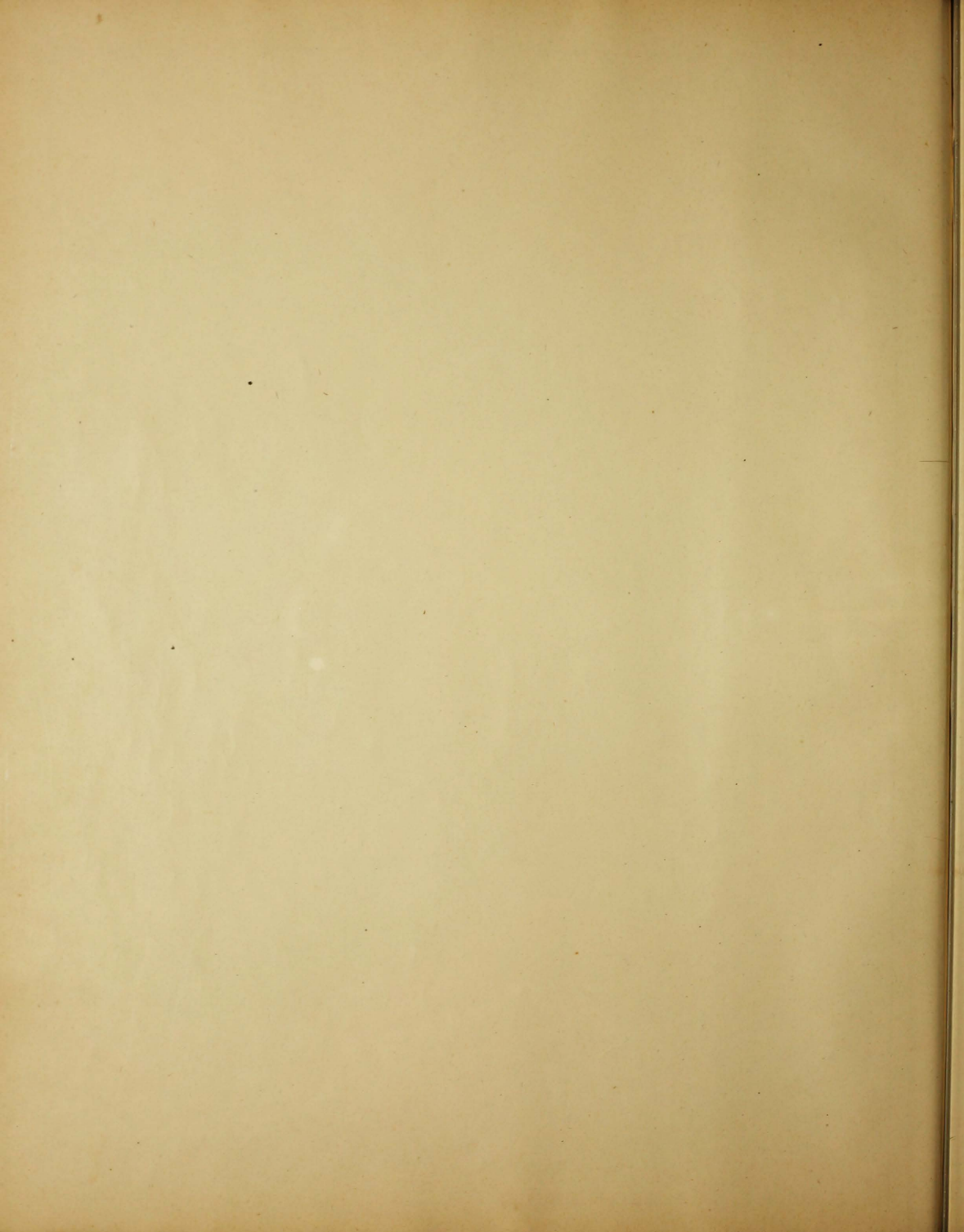
MAP OF CONNECTICUT

MEMBERS OF CONGRESS.

Previous to the Representatives from this State were elected by the people at large. The number at first, under the Constitution, was five, and by their representation it was changed in 1793 to six, and in 1803 to eight. Under the act of 1803 they were elected one from each of the six districts into which the State was divided by an Act of the General Assembly, since that they have been elected, one from each of the four districts established by the General Assembly of 1819.

Since the Constitution was amended, the counties of Hartford and Tolland, district number two, the counties of New Haven and Middlesex, district number three, the counties of New London and Windham, district number four, the counties of Fairfield and Litchfield.

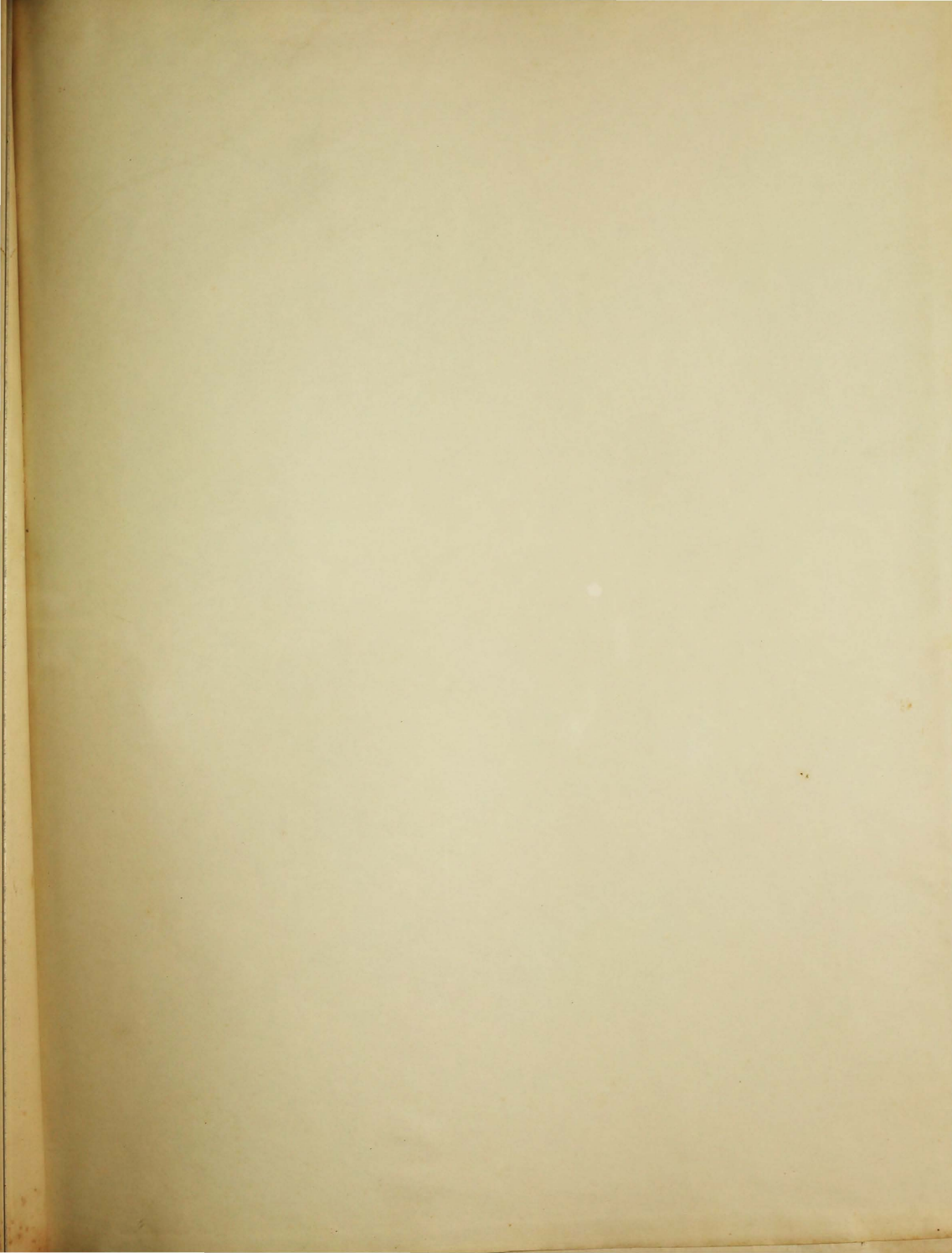

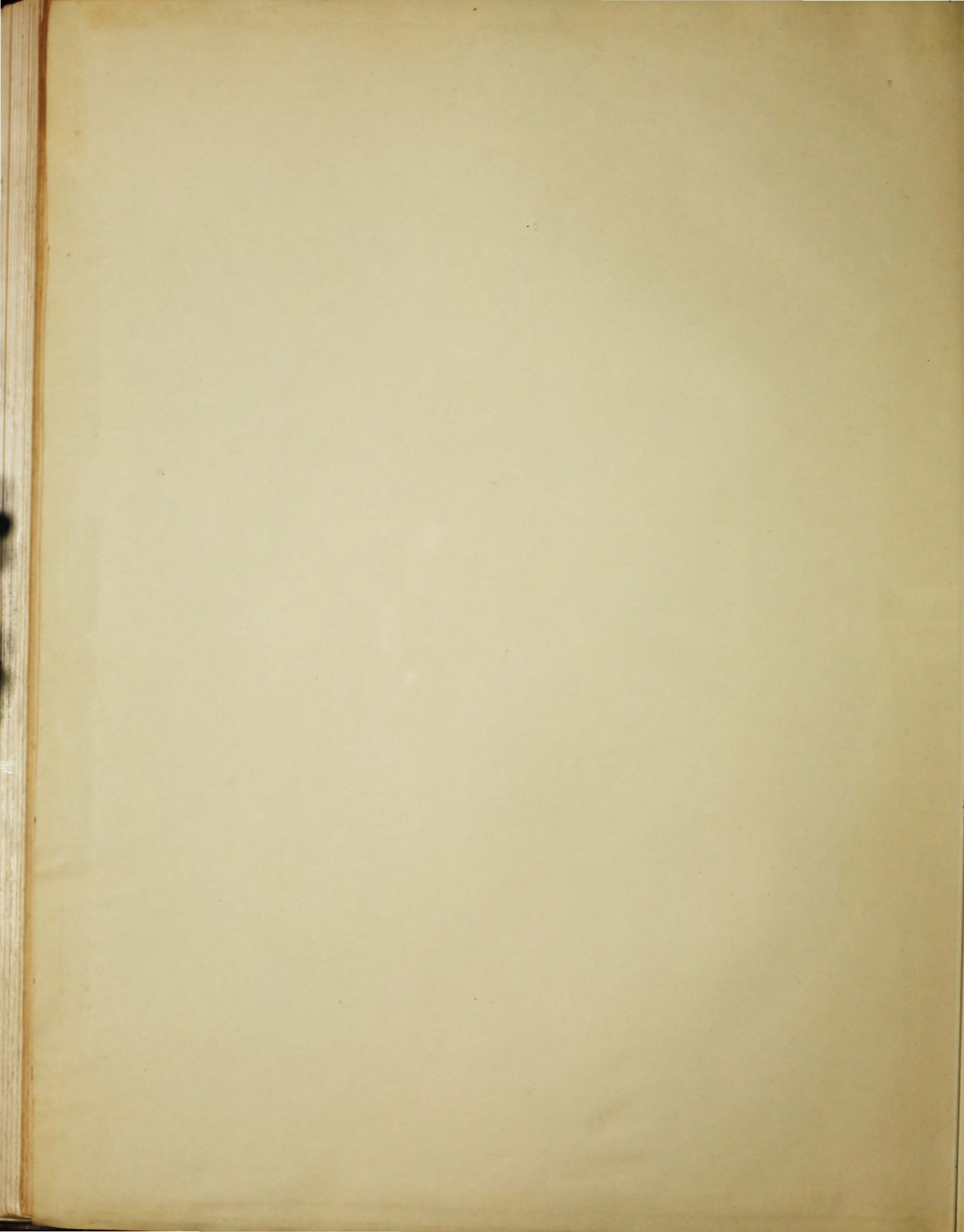
