Mission:

The Ridgefield Historical Society's purpose is to preserve, interpret and foster public knowledge of Ridgefield's historical, cultural, and architectural heritage.

The purpose of the annual meeting each year is to welcome our membership and to report on the progress of all strategic and tactical achievements from the past year, Oct 2023 to October 2024.

This past year has been another productive one for the Historical Society as we continued to develop our team of staff and volunteers and through our planning to better support our mission to serve as a vital organization in the community. This team building strategy has allowed us to continue to pursue new initiatives and expand the organizations visibility.

The Historical Society completed its first full year with Stephen Bartkus in the role of Executive Director. With the security of this role in place, we have been able to establish clear lines between operational responsibilities and high-level board oversight as well as continued to establish clear goals and objectives for the future. These goals include continuing to build a strong and effective Board of Directors as well as matching our staff to the growing needs of the organization:

In addition to the staff in place comprised of Executive Director, Stephen Bartkus,, Collections Manager, Betsy Reid and Book keeper, Cathy Malloy, we have added 2 new key members to the team.

Development Consultant, Peter Authier

In addition to these new team members we have tremendous support through consultants, Phil Yarnall – Graphic Designer and Mike Carusi, Webmaster.

Financial and Committee Reviews:

2023/2024 Report

Finance Chair and Treasurer, Steven March oversaw overall fiscal responsibilities which included: budgeting and financial planning, reporting, and monitoring, internal controls and accountability, transparency, and risk management and monitoring other risk management areas.

Implemented this year:

The Investment Committee met several times this year and finalized the Long and Short-term investment strategy. Based on this board-approved strategy, the Investment Committee then created a proposed investment portfolio at Vanguard which was also

subsequently board-approved. The existing funds at UBS and Infinix were transferred to the newly opened Vanguard investment account and the investment portfolio was executive.

The Financial Sustainability report was written for RHS, which will be used to guide the organization in its financial decisions and used with potential donors to explain our operational funds.

Roles and Responsibilities: The day-to-day financial operational tasks of RHS were migrated from the Board Treasurer to the Executive Director. This includes the payment of all incoming invoices and deposits, as well as monitoring the current operating cash position of RHS. The Executive director works with his executive assistant and the bookkeeper to complete these daily tasks.

LGBTQIA+ Oral History Project

This program is on track with 21 of 25 interviews completed. The remining interviews have been scheduled and should be completed in November.

National Park Service American Battlefield Protection Program Grant Phase II:

BOR Archaeology Project

The State Historic Preservation Office circulated the Historical Society's RFP to all cultural resource management companies who work in CT. The application period ends on Oct. 31.

New Board member James Segalstein will work with Stephen Bartkus on the next phase of the NPS Grant project.

<u>Membership</u>

Under the guidance of Membership Chair, Tatjana Witzmann, Executive Dircetor Stephen Bartkus, Marketing team, Nancy Rowe, Sally Sanders, and Graphic dwsigner, Phil Yarnall, a new campaign was redesigned to include new membership levels and benefits. The annual membership drive was moved to the spring to coincide with the start of the fiscal year. Rack cards were designed for this campaign. The Catoonah Circle, a sustaining membership tier (\$1,000+) was created, and we currently have 22 members (\$22,000). Membership 2022-23: 224 households. Membership 2024-2025 to date (3 months into the membership year): 150 households.

We have created a new Board role to focus on organizing events throughout the year to focus on this new level. Our first event will be the "Opening of the Vault" party on Thursday, October 17, 2024, as a special recognition for members of the Catoonah Circle. The evening will showcase Ridgefield treasures from our collection housed in the climate-controlled vault beneath our historic 1714 Scott House. The evening will include guided tours of the vault, access to seldom seen Ridgefield artifacts from past centuries, and a chance to meet the Board of Directors, Executive Director, Staff as well as fellow history enthusiasts and supporters.

This year's mailing was followed by a press release, a series of eblasts, and personal email reminders were sent to promote the new Membership Drive. Membership continues to grow each year due to an increase in yearly membership campaigns with targeted follow-up.

In addition to the newly formed Catoonah Circle, member benefits include priority registration and early access to ticket sales, an invitation to exclusive members-only events, discounts on paid program and our gift shop.

<u>Marketing</u>

The marketing team, Nancy Rowe and Sally Sanders, continued to promote Ridgefield Historical Society events and programs through press releases and social media in an increasingly fragmented media environment.

Working with Stephen Bartkus and Janet Graves, the marketing Committee writes/edits the monthly eBlast newsletter and Sally Sanders prepares a twice-yearly Scott House Journal, focusing on an aspect of history that's relevant to current historical society or town events. Most recently, the Branchville Schoolhouse history was featured, using archived materials from our collection including an oral history done with a former Branchville student.

The Marketing team promoted the second year of the Witness Stones Project installation at Scott House last November and continues to promote the popular monthly Ridgefield History Club.

The big project of 2023-2024 was the Ridgefield Holiday Historic House Tour, a fund-raiser in cooperation with Tiger Hollow, which sold out its 700+ tour tickets as well as its gala preview. The event was our first true fundraiser, led by co-chairs Steve March, Stacey Schibli, and Jill Rae. We look forward to working with Tiger Hollow again in 2025 to plan another successful collaboration. In the spring, the committee promoted Dr. Darla Shaw's Fabulous Women of Ridgefield bus tour; this fall, among numerous other events, the team is working on a Great Estates bus tour with Jack Sanders. The marketing for the next big event, a June 2025 garden tour, in collaboration with the Ridgefield Garden Club, is now underway.

The marketing team works closely with special projects director <u>Laurie McGavin</u> <u>Bachmann</u> to plan and promote special events throughout the year.

Special Projects

Goals: The Special Projects team was established in November 2023 to create regular mission-driven programs and events that preserve, interpret, and foster public knowledge of Ridgefield's historical, cultural, and architectural heritage and fulfill the RHS strategic plan to engage the greater Ridgefield community. Many of these programs and events were new, SOLD-OUT, and income-producing. **Team:** Led by Laurie McGavin Bachmann (former RHS Recording Secretary) with Nancy Rowe (Marketing and former RHS Executive Director) as an assistant, the Special Projects committee also includes Stephen Bartkus, (Current RHS Executive Director), and Sally Sanders, (Marketing + Peter Parley Schoolhouse). This team meets on the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of the month. The aim of the committee is to create a robust offering of programs and events that bring the face of the Ridgefield Historical

Other Participants: Representatives from the Membership Committee are needed to participate, as well as volunteers from Collections and other Committees. Increased awareness of the Ridgefield Historical Society will bolster Membership, Fundraising, Volunteerism, Finance, and all other committees and projects of the Ridgefield Historical Society.

Society to the Ridgefield community and beyond.

Partners: Over the past fiscal year, the Special Projects Committee has partnered with: Amazing Tales from Off and On Connecticut's Beaten Path, Cooper-Hewitt Museum in NYC, Downtown Ridgefield, Lounsbury House, Peter Parley Schoolhouse, Ridgefield Garden Club, Pride in the Park, Ridgefield Chamber of Commerce, Ridgefield Graveyard Committee, Ridgefield Library, Ridgefield Public Schools, Ridgefield Theater Barn, Town of Ridgefield, Town Hall Exhibits, St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, The Benjamin Restaurant, Tiger Hollow and Wilton Grange.

Sponsorship Model - The *Fascinating Women of Ridgefield* program held on March 23, 2023, co-hosted with Dr. Darla Shaw, was identified as a 'pilot' program for partnership/sponsorship. Karla Murtaugh/Compass was offered a sponsorship at a modest rate, and the team explored options and costs for sponsorship benefits

including: logo development and placement; event program sponsorship; goody bag sponsorship and recognition across multiple channels. Sponsorship is repeatable for the future events with advance planning; staff/volunteer resources; and the correct sponsorship funding level to cover costs and contribute to Historical Society income.

Program/Event Types: Many diverse programs and events were offered: author talks; bus tours; a commemorative Town ceremony for Covid victims; craft program (signature silhouette workshop in Dec); community outreach tables; exhibits; lectures; a new monthly history club (now mtg on 3rd Tuesdays); Peter Parley Schoolhouse programs/school tours (open Sunday 1-4 from May-Oct); membership events; theatrical production; (Eccentric Women of Ridgefield) scavenger hunt; (Townwide Where's Waldo for children/families) as well as walking tours.

Audiences Served: Many different audiences were served: children, families, school groups, young people, adults, seniors, Ridgefield Public School-students, teachers & administrators, Town of Ridgefield representatives, members of the LGBTQ and Tiger Hollow communities.

Stacey Schibli was Co–Coordinator of this fundraising event. *Over 92K was raised and half of the proceeds after expenses went to the Historical Society = \$46,000*

Fundraising Committee Chair and Members Needed: Now that the Special Projects Committee has been formed and is executing a rhythm of mission-driven programs and events that populate the fall/winter/spring calendar year (with summer as a time for planning), a separate fundraising lead/committee is needed to create special fundraising events, ideally twice a year. Note: Fundraising is a very different kind of activity from programming.

Fundraising for fiscal year 2023-24 - there will be the Ridgefield Garden Tour, including a Garden Party Preview event in a private home (Friday evening, June 6, 2024) and tours of 7 Ridgefield Gardens (Sunday, June 8, 2024). Stacey Schibli is coordinating this Fundraising Event with support from Marketing and other RHS committees.

Fundraising for fiscal year 2024-25 - another Historic Holiday House Tour to be offered jointly with Tiger Hollow is being planned for the first weekend of December 2024.

Summary

This has been a very busy year for the Special Projects Committee with many new, annual and ongoing programs and events taking place. By meeting twice a month, this committee has been able to increase the amount and breadth of the Ridgefield Historical Society's program and event offerings - which has led to increased attendance and in many cases to sold-out programs and income. Instead of going from program to program, the Special Projects Committee can now plan a season at-aglance (i.e. Fall/Winter, Winter/Spring and Summer. I am very grateful to my colleagues on this committee, Stephen Bartkus, Nancy Rowe and Sally Sanders whose creativity, vision and hard work have made these positive steps possible.

Technology

Since the last annual meeting, the Technology team has been building upon the investments and great work that had been done previously which has resulted in:

- Upgraded PCs / laptops and fast, reliable and stable WIFI networking and access
 to the Internet supporting improved operational productivity of the Society's staff
 and volunteers. For example, multiple people are now able to use the
 PastPerfect cataloging system at the same time, participate in web meetings,
 print and scan documents, etc..
- Digitization and organized online sharing of materials relating to the Society's collections / archives and ongoing projects. For example, oral history recordings of Ridgefield veterans of World War II have been digitized and transcribed and the recordings and the related transcripts are now available for the general public to listen to / read via the Society's public website. There are now ongoing projects to record, and publish online (initially via the Society's public website and later to the Connecticut Digital Archive), video recordings of LGBTQ+ oral histories of Ridgefield residents as well as the scanning of hundreds of photo negatives that were donated by the former Korker Photographic studio in Ridgefield. These photo negatives, which capture images that were taken from

the very early 1950's thru to the 1980's, will also be made available for people to view via the Society's public website.

Ongoing support for the various projects and activities of the Society. One such example would be the introduction and use of mobile apps and credit card readers that allow Society memberships and products to be purchased while at external events such as SummerFest, etc.. Other examples_would be support for the Society's Historic activities related to Collections / Archives, Historic Preservation, Finance, Marketing, Membership, Programming, etc.

Ridgefield Historical Society Scholarship

The 2024 Ridgefield Historical Society Scholarship was awarded to graduating senior, Marko Katra at the Ridgefield High School Award Ceremony in June. The scholarship — founded in 2022 — encourages students to share their individual perspectives on our Town's history.

Internships

Thanks to the continued support of the Goldstone

Family Foundation and the Kasuli Family, Ridgefield Historical Society offers two paid internships.

The Kasuli Internship honors the memory of the late Georgianne Kasuli, a longtime member of the Board of the Ridgefield Historical Society. The *Goldstone Family Internship* is part of a program which supports the hiring of interns across several Ridgefield non-profit organizations. Both internships provide growth and learning opportunities for the intern, and much appreciated assistance and fresh perspective for the organization.

Volunteers

Thanks to outreach and programming efforts in community the Historical Society's volunteer base continues to grow as we attract new volunteers including the increase of support through our High School students, College students and recent grads, as well

as continue to work with the Boys and Girls club, the National Charity League. Volunteers are the key to our success.

Peter Parley Schoolhouse

Jack and Sally Sanders continue to volunteer at the Peter Parley/West Lane District Schoolhouse for the Last Sundays at the Schoolhouse and keep watch on the building during the off-season.

In March, Dr. Darla Shaw, with Dennis Waymire and Christine Johnsmeyer, presented schoolhouse sessions for third grade classes from the Branchville Elementary School. Dr. Shaw also presented a program for a group of homeschooled girls in May and in June, Jack and Sally Sanders hosted a group of pre-schoolers from the Creative Children's Korner. Although Dr. Shaw is not able to lead classes this fall, Mr. Waymire and Ms. Johnsmeyer have stepped in to lead a session for the homeschoolers in November.

The Gateway Project, a public-private partnership that aims to enhance three triangles along Route 35 from the New York border to Main Street, will bring new landscaping and upgrades to the Peter Parley Schoolhouse property. Discussion of details is ongoing but the project is expected to include a more defined parking area and the installation of a period outhouse (with chemical toilet) to replace the current porta-potty. Repairs to the building are also planned.

This project will also involve the Mitchell watering trough at the Olmstead Lane triangle and the Cass Gilbert Fountain. The Ridgefield Historical Society has been involved in the planning for the Schoolhouse offering perspectives on how the building and surrounding land were used, since the first school was established there in the mid-18th Century.

Collections

This year, Collections added 90 new accessions to our archive, ranging from the Roger Bullard architectural papers and drawings and to a collection of Native American artifacts from Richardson Park. All have been added to our collections database, Past Perfect, and uploaded to our online archive on our website, where they may be viewed by the public.

Our volunteer number now stands at 16. Together they contribute a total of 40 hours per week cataloging, organizing, scanning and transcribing - including work on the LGBTQIA+ oral history project and the Korker Photography Collection.

The \$10,000 grant that we received from the Thrift Shop in April 2024 has been a huge benefit enabling us to carefully preserve these new accessions and will continue helping with more that are to come.

In Collections we work with both the Architectural Archive Committee and the Historic Preservation Committee doing preservation work and research.

We are continuing to collaborate with the Ridgefield Public Schools.

The historical society's recently acquired collection of Native American artifacts from Richardson Park were exhibited at Ridgefield High School in September. We plan on continuing to exhibit the collection in the schools in the future.

In addition, we are working with both middle schools and the Witness Stones Project to research and remember the enslaved persons who lived in the David Scott House. This November will be our third installation ceremony involving students and faculty. Exhibits at town hall are ongoing and are changed every few months. We created exhibits with two non-profits in town celebrating their 50th Anniversary - Meals on Wheels and the Ridgefield Recycling Center. Other exhibits included the Branchville Schoolhouse, the Battle of Ridgefield and 9/11.

Buildings and Grounds

The Society maintains Four historic buildings and properties. These buildings include the **David Scott House**, which serves as our Headquarters and houses our state of art vault. **The Peter Parley Schoolhouse**, a Bauhaus inspired post World War II property, recently given to the Society to be maintained by the Historical Society and serve as a place for future educational programs, specifically related to Post WWII architecture, history, and design. There is a small cottage on the property where we can collect income from a tenant.

As of Oct 15th, The Historical Society is officially the Steward of the **Branchville Schoolhouse**. A Public Hearing was held for the lease on Wed. Sept. 25 at 7:30pm and the Special Town Meeting on Wed. Oct. 9 at 7:30pm at Scotts Ridge Middle School where over 300 residents unanimously voted to approve the lease. The Society subsequently signed a multi-year lease with the Town of Ridgefield with the intent to restore the dilapidated building. A capital campaign is planned to kick off later this year. Both schoolhouses were listed on the State Register of Historic Places in June 2024. The Historic Preservation Committee together with the Executive Director will oversee this project, by forming a committee and pursuing fundraising through grants and private donations.

Architectural Archives Committee

The Architectural Archives Committee was created in 2019 and seeks to collect architectural material for the Warren Arthur Architectural Archives at the RHS. Mai Arthur contributed funding for the creation of this new archive, named in honor of her husband.

A fortunate outcome of the shortcomings of the grant-funded Historic Resources Inventory historic context was the beginnings of a building photo-inventory by street number and address. This will become part of the electronic database created by and managed by both the Historic Preservation and Architectural Archives Committees. In 2024, Kevin Julier (Technology) joined with Betsy Reid and her interns to create the Grand List Project, a Google-based platform that holds individual folders by street

number and address. Al Garzi, town assessor provided the Society the current property database which includes both taxable and tax-exempt properties.

We are fortunate that one of our new volunteers, Sarah Kaplan has graciously engaged in the Roger H. Bullard collection and is reviewing and updating the collection inventory. This may serve as an opportunity for another volunteer, to assist the Committee in getting some public awareness and the basis for a presentation in 2026.

Outreach was undertaken in 2021 to seek materials from local architects but has yet not produced any substantive interest.

Historic Preservation Committee

The Historic Preservation Committee is expanding its volunteer base as our work continues to grow.

Historic Resources Inventory

Continued management of the town-wide Historic Resources Inventory (HRI) on behalf of the Ridgefield Historical Society and the Town of Ridgefield Historic District Commission. Commonwealth Heritage, now Chronicle Heritage, produced a historic context draft in August 2023 which was very problematic and took considerable effort by the Committee to address the substantive issues. A "FINAL," dated August 15, 2024 was submitted by Chronicle, and while issues were substantively addressed, fine-tuning remains to be completed. Random sampling of numerous Historic Resources Inventory (HRI) forms found them to be questionable regarding *accuracy*. In agreement with First Selectman, for numerous errors, formatting issues, delays in producing revisions and issues with HRI form accuracies, a decision was made in September 2024 to terminate the contract, whose deliverables deadlines had long expired.

A new volunteer, April Pereyra, is going to be working with Melanie Marks to review and make corrections to the HRI forms.

A second, \$30, 000.00 Survey and Planning Grant with matching amount for HDC for a total of \$60,000.00 will be sought from the State of Connecticut for the contractors to create 500 more HRI forms. An HRI presentation is planned for March, 2025.

A new volunteer position has been created to provide updates for our website and social media to begin publicizing the activities around Historic Preservation.

Demolition Delay Ordinance

The revised Demolition Delay Ordinance has been in place for about a year and in this fiscal year we received six demolition notices, none of which were objected to after research and understanding of the need/want. One demolition that got by the Building Department was the eighteenth-century farmhouse at 42 Whipstick Road. Used ZBA to justify a "remodel" and a building permit was issued. A new project to monitor town commission agendas is underway (September) and a new volunteer, Christina Marchessault, has taken it on. Melanie Marks graciously volunteered to keep the records of the Demo Delay requests on behalf of the Committee.

Gateway Project

In late February 2024, the Ridgefield Historical Society was asked to join a meeting with First Selectman, Rudy Marconi, and longtime Ridgefield benefactor and project proponent in discussing plans for three separate site improvements dubbed *The Gateway Project*. All town-owned sites, they include the Cass Gilbert Fountain, the so-called watering trough, and the Peter Parley Schoolhouse.

The intent of the project which, was intended to improve the sites that are at key entry points to the town center. Plans prepared by Landscape Architect, Jane Didona included site redevelopment plans.

Numerous meetings, including on-site have been undertaken since to fine-tune the proposals.

The Nominating Committee

The aim of the Nominating Committee is to sustain the RHS board by identifying new board directors and assist in filling current board resource needs. Our focus is to develop classes of future board members to take on seats as individual terms expire every 2 years.

It was a busy year for the nominating committee, with a large number of directors' terms coming up for reelection and with new term limits coming into effect several seats being vacated.

On the executive committee, Tracy Seem, President is relinquishing her role after two consecutive terms and is on the slate to reelected to as a director. Tracy led the board during some of the most significant changes in the Society's history. She initiated and oversaw our strategic plan and actively recruited new board members to help drive our mission forward. Among her many accomplishments evident throughout this report, she led the upgrading of our financial organization, acquiring new assets and projects such as the Mai Arthur property and the Branchville School House, as well as an extremely successful Battle of Ridgefield celebration for the town. Steve March, Treasurer is stepping down from the board after a successful term. He was instrumental in improving our financial operations, controls and systems, including bookkeeping. Steve led the effort to form the new investment committee and consolidating our investment accounts. Both Tracy and Steve will be joining our Advisory Committee and continue to help attract opportunities for development and projects. Sara Champion, having served in the

legal and compliance capacity and been a long-standing member of the board, is leaving her position. She plans to continue volunteering her time in genealogy. Nancy Rowe, who has served as executive director in the past, and most recently, in marketing and public relations will be leaving her board post. She too expects to continue to volunteer her time on projects for the society.

We are most grateful for all their tremendous efforts and extraordinary contribution to the Society.

The nominating committee started the year, focusing on individual board role requirements and current director's future expectations. As the year progressed the focus turned to recruiting candidates for the board to fill new and vacating positions. With both the president and treasurer seats openings, significant effort was dedicated to their replacement. We searched both internally and externally for candidates and are pleased to nominate two new board members on the slate for president and treasurer. Additionally, we are nominating four new board members on the slate to take on various roles.

The committee is continuing to develop new candidates for the board. Combined with the new term limits adopted, our goal is to develop classes of directors that join the board and form the basis of future executive committee members.
